Dear Parents and Carers,

By now you will know about the planned merger of Duncombe Primary School and Montem Primary School. The proposal is in consultation stage and it is really important that as parents, you make your views known. Nelson Mandela Year 6: Zane




The Galapagos Islands


Update from Fiona, UKS2 Phase lead:


Year 4

In Year 4, children wrote amazing poems about fireworks using similes, metaphors and personification. They used powerful vocabulary to create mesmerising images in the reader's mind!

Year 1

In Year 1, this week we have been learning about one more and one less than a given number. They have learnt to check their answers on the number line. The children were challenged to write their numbers in words as well.



Update from Saffa, KS1 Phase lead:

In Year 1 this week, children have been learning all about their numbers to 20. They are using practical resources to create the number and then discussing what comes before and after the number. The children in Year 2 have been writing a narrative based on the poem 'The owl and the pussycat'. They have used their excellent ideas to innovate and make the story their own. Once the children are done, we will be sharing them with year 1 at story time. We can't wait! We are very proud of all the hard work happening in KS1!

Reception

In reception we started a new core story - Little Jack. The children have really immersed themselves in it, role playing the characters and using the key words in writing and play.

Update from EYFS Phase lead:

This week in EYFS children have learnt about migration. Migration is magic. They have learnt that many birds begin their migration to warmer climates. Some birds, such as swallows, swifts and nightingales will leave the UK to spend the winter months in Africa. Do you know which birds migrate? Not all birds migrate — common garden birds, such as blue tits and robins may never move far from where they were born.
