What are we learning in the Nursery this term?

This term our theme is "Winter Festivals – Let's celebrate!"

Reading: Reading with your child

Sharing a book with a child is fun! It's a time for closeness, laughing and talking together – and it can also give children a flying start in life and help them become lifelong readers.

Spending 10 minutes a day reading to your child helps them develop social and emotional skills and become confident, happy learners.

Just ten minutes shared reading a day can help your child grow into a happy, confident learner - and it's also loads of fun!

Top tips for reading together

- Find somewhere quiet away from noise, TV and mobile phones.
- Cuddle up together or get brothers and sisters to join in and enjoy stories and rhymes together.
- Make animal noises or sound effects – these help to bring the story to life and will make you both laugh!

Ask questions when you're reading together such as:

'What can you see on this page?'

'How do you think the characters feel?'

- Try asking your child to tell or retell the story.

They can 'read' the pictures to you and talk about what's happening on the page.

- If you feel comfortable, try making funny faces or using character voices – these always make children giggle!

Look at the pictures and start talking about them:

Can you find a dinosaur or a rabbit? What else can you see? How many bananas are there?

What games are the children playing?
